



"The Ascension of Jesus was an important growth point for the disciples. Jesus would be with them in a different way from now on."

To be chronologically correct, the Gospel should be read *before* our

first reading today. The reason is that we have the end of St Luke's Gospel and then the First Reading, which is the beginning of St Luke's sequel to his Gospel, which is the Acts of the Apostles. As the scripture scholar Father Kieran O'Mahony says: "The gospel of Luke closes with a great air of expectation, as the apostles wait to be clothed with power from on high. In this way, the writer prepares carefully for his second volume, the start of which was our first reading today. There is a special flavour to the ending in Luke because it bridges a two-volume work (Luke's Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles), synthesising comprehensively yet unobtrusively the themes of the third gospel and leaving the reader in a mood of anticipation." St Luke begins The Acts of the Apostles with the following words: "In my earlier work, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and I taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven."

St Luke then leaves us with this wonderful description of the Ascension which concludes with the promise of the return of Jesus to earth at the end of time: "He was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.' The Ascension of Jesus was an important turning point for the disciples. Jesus would remain with them but in a different way. Challenging though it was, it was necessary for them to let go of his part of his life with them. Jesus asks his apostles to wait patiently for the moment of grace which will come with Pentecost. Often in our world everything has to happen instantly, so it's a challenge for us all to wait for things to happen in God's time. It is important to remember that, as the scripture scholar Father Martin Hogan notes, that this promise that Jesus made to his apostles, he also made to Christians right down through the ages and he now makes the very same promise to us all today. There could not be a more appropriate message for us as church today.

In the Church in Ireland at this time, we are all missionaries. Let us pray in these special days of grace between the Ascension and the Feast of Pentecost next Sunday that we will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit which will assist us on our journey of faith and in sharing that faith with the people that we meet at home, at work, at school and at college.
